# **High School Girls' Opportunities**

Through the efforts of Senior/Ambassador Troop Leaders Lauren Ahillen and Jackie McMahon, Troop #395 will be providing a series of events and activities geared specifically toward the interests of high school-aged girls.

Troop #395 is not like your little sister's Girl Scout Brownie Troop. This troop is for high school girls who have busy schedules but still want to be involved in Girl Scout activities. They will meet face-to-face periodically, but they will more often "meet" via email and social websites to make plans for upcoming events and activities. Maybe they'll sell cookies or participate in other money-earning opportunities to fund those events and activities.

Lauren and Jackie will also serve as advisors for girls who want to begin taking steps toward earning the Gold Award or other recognitions. According to the Girl Scout website "The Girl Scout Gold Award is the highest award that a Girl Scout 14-18 may earn. Someone once described the Girl Scout Gold Award as being 'what you really want to be remembered for' in Girl Scouting. For many, the leadership skills, organizational skills, and sense of community and commitment that come from 'going for the Gold' set the foundation for a lifetime of active citizenship."

Since the interests of the girls will be varied, some of the girls in the troop might decide that they want to participate in a job shadowing program while others want to go camping, on a hike, or to one of the four world centers, Our Cabaña in Cuernavaca, Mexico; Our Chalet in Adelboden, Switzerland; Pax Lodge in London,

England; or Sangam in Pune, India. Some of the girls in this troop might choose to do it all!

Don't forget that Girl Scouts is a great place for girls to earn their community service hours regardless of why they are needed. Of course the girls will also be able to participate in all the activities that Guam Girl Scouts offers to its members.

## Take Action

In 2008, Girl Scouts of the USA introduced new program materials to be used at the troop level. These materials are called "Journeys". The Journeys are the tools to help the girls succeed with the "New Girl Scout Leadership Experience."

By accomplishing the activities in the books, the girls will discover the three "keys" to leadership.

The first key is "Discover". Girls understand themselves and their values and use their knowledge and skills to explore the world. The benefits intended for girls from the discover key include:

· Developing a strong sense of self

• Developing positive values

· Gaining practical life skills and practicing healthy living

· Seeking challenges in the world

· Developing critical thinking skills

The second key is "Connect". Girls care about, inspire, and team with others locally and globally. Benefits for girls include:

 Developing healthy relationships

· Promoting cooperation and team-building

• Resolving conflicts

· Advancing diversity in a multicultural world

 Feeling connected to their local and global communities

The third key is **"Take** Action". Girls act to make the world a better place. Benefits intended for girls include:


Identifying community needs

· Working as resourceful problem-solvers

· Educating and inspiring others to act

• Advocating for themselves and others, at home and around the world

· Feeling empowered to make a difference



"Take Action" grant to offset some of the costs associated with training girls and adults. The grant is dispersed by Girl Scouts of the USA, but funded by the Corporation for National & Community Service Learn & Serve.

> Our first Take Action Training Session was held in July. Girl Scout Juniors through Ambassadors, their parents and all Girl Scout Leaders were invited to this all-day training.

Local non-profit organizations were invited to take advantage of this opportunity by discussing with the girls and adults ways that Guam Girl Scouts can help their organizations, and therefore, the island. Six organizations were represented in the hopes of

becoming community partners and beneficiaries of the Take Action projects.

There are seven key elements or phases to a successful Take Action Project:

1. Map It - Investigate community needs & try to discover the "root" of the problem

2. Plan It - Prepare a Take Action Plan

3. Do It - Act "with" the community

impact 5. Advocate It -Demonstrate the importance of the issue to others 6. Be Proud of It -

Celebrate the accomplishments 7. Keep It Going - think about how the project

could be sustained.



#### **Defining Community Service Projects**

Some community service projects address an immediate need in the community, but they do so for only a short period of time.

#### **Defining Take Action Projects**

When girls pursue Take Action projects, they take time to identify and understand the root cause of the issue they are addressing. Girls also must make sure that each project is sustainable and that the impact is measurable.


Measurable: The success of the project can be determine based on the number of people the project helped, the number of people who were involved, any reduction in the community's need, and other concrete numbers.

Sustainable: Girls must make arrangements (such as collaborating with community leaders and/or organizations; building alliances with mentors) to ensure that the project creates lasting change and is not a one-time event.

Take Action encourages girls to think bigger and to address problems in such a way that

they do not reoccur. And, perhaps most important, a girl's Take Action project changes the world in a meaningful way.

Girls can identify community needs. In order for girls to start working on their award projects, they must first find out what the community is in need of. Girls also learn how to identify the root cause of the issue they choose to address.



Girls advocate for themselves and others, locally and globally. As they learn about the issues in their communities and work to solve them, girls stand up for issues they believe in, influence policy, and identify ways to continue their project goals into the future.

When girls pursue Take Action projects, they take time to identify and understand the root cause of the issue they are addressing.
